





SHIP SANITATION CERTIFICATES (SSCC & SSCEC)





COMPLIANCE & CONFORMITY

A regulatory instrument to minimise the risk of spreading disease vectors and required more and more by Port States when entering their jurisdiction

HEALTHY & SAFE TO TRAVEL

Proves to Port States and local authorities that you have taken all measures to minimise risk to health and that you are safe to visit their ports & anchorages.









WHAT ARE THEY?

Documents that corroborate a ship's compliance with maritime sanitation and quarantine rules specified in article 39 of the International Health Regulations (2005) issued by the World Health Organization.

WHY DO I NEED ONE?

Port state authorities may ask for it and potentially enforce a vessel isolation without a valid certificate during the state of alarm, particularly if the last port of call was in a high-risk area. The certificate indicates to Port State inspectors that the vessel is well maintained and healthy.

WHICH ONE DO I NEED?

A Ship Sanitation Control Exemption Certificate (SSCEC) is a certificate serves as proof that the ship is free and clear sources of disease vectors and may be a requirement for permission of entry into port in some jurisdictions. A Ship Sanitation Control Certificate (SSCC) is a certificate issued when a health risk is found, and control measures (fumigation, etc.) have been successfully carried out.

HOW LONG ARE THEY VALID?

Certificates are valid for six months, revocable if evidence of health risks are found, and the ship always remains liable to further inspection.

HOW DO I OBTAIN ONE?

SSC's are issued by competent health authorities in authorized ports after inspection.
